During this 3- year period, JSDF, in collaboration with the Moriah Group Research Firm, will identify barriers that keep many children of color from thriving in Mississippi as a result of systems, policies and/or practices,

As JSDF commemorates its 10th year anniversary of providing services to and advocating for communities of color, Dr. Karla McCullough, the Project Director of the grant and Executive Director of JSDF stated, “For a decade our focus has centered around direct services for youth of color and over the last 5 years, organically expanded into systems-driven work, as we help to disrupt systemic racism in a time that it is vital to our community and the state. We are extremely excited that the W.K. Kellogg Foundation is partnering with us and look forward to intentionally working with a diverse group of individuals, agencies and organizations that share the same goal. When the full humanity of people of color is afforded, our community, state and country will thrive!”.

JSDF’s Program officer from W.K. Kellogg Foundation says:

The key outcome of this project is to bring awareness to and create more equitable practices, policies, and procedures at the systems level. This will involve developing relationships and partnering with ‘decision makers’ in various Mississippi systems in order for the appropriate changes to occur and to ensure people of color, specifically, children, in Mississippi can grow and thrive.
